The Formal Garden

The Formal Garden was built in the late 1800s as a kitchen garden that extended over some 1.6 ha (4 acres) to the north-east of Benmore House, and at one time it had long herbaceous borders and two large conservatories which had been reduced to ruin and finally lost in the gales of 1968.

Now the Formal Garden boasts a large collection of ornamental conifers suitable for the smaller garden. There are over 200 plants, ranging from the dwarf conifers suitable for a rock garden to tall trees with a range of colourful foliage which give year round interest and a spectacular contrast to the surrounding garden.

Pucks Hut provides a welcome shelter from those west coast showers.



Nestled in a shaded cleft in the hillside, it will be landscaped inside and out with a range of native and exotic ferns. It has also been identified as an ideal site for the cultivation of *Trichomanes speciosum*, the Killarney fern, one of Britain's most rare species, protected under UK and European legislation.

Other endangered native species will be cultivated to highlight general issues of plant and habitat conservation. There will be range of training opportunities for staff, students, general interest groups and the public as well as educational activities, tours and visitor events throughout the project
